Speakers' Club Handbook

Welcome to Speakers' Club! Before we can get started we need to go over a few rules and expectations to make Speakers' Club a success. In order for us to succeed everyone must participate!

Expectations

Opening Address

• Each member must begin their presentation with "Good morning chairperson, teacher, other adults, and fellow students."

Voice

- Use a loud, clear voice
- Make eye contact
- Do not have anything in your mouth
- Avoid being monotonous
- Do not speak too quickly!

Body Language

- Maintain good posture
- Face your audience
- Avoid playing with objects (ex. Cue cards, clipboard)

Organization and Preparation

- You must be fully prepared for all presentations (you will be handing in all cue cards each meeting)
- Do not attempt to "wing it"
- Make sure you include all necessary elements to receive full marks

Closing

- Each member must end their presentation with an appropriate concluding statement
- Ex. "And in conclusion... Thank you for your time today"

Duties of Speakers' Club Presenters

Chairperson

- 1. Have the agenda filled out
- 2. Call the meeting to order and conclusion at the end
- 3. Introduce each speaker and their topic
- 4. Keep the meeting running smoothly, and do not tolerate interruptions/noise
- 5. Keep all members handed in speeches in order

Evaluator

- 1. Will help teacher evaluate each students' performance
- 2. Must give accurate, fair marks and quality comments
- 3. Must fill out the marking sheets for each speaker and give suggestions
- 4. Fill out the Oratory Skills evaluation for each presenter
- 5. Must provide everyone their marks at the end of the meeting

General Reporter

- 1. Tell the group your expectations for the meeting
- 2. Fill out the General Reporter's Form
- 3. Choose 3 highlights of the meeting to share with the class
- 4. Give 3 suggestions on how the meeting could have been better
- 5. Choose a favorite speech of the day and tell why

Poetry

- 1. Choose and introduce your poem and the poet
- 2. Briefly summarize the poem and your reason for choosing it
- 3. Provide a copy of the poem for the teacher
- 4. Recite the poem
- 5. Include introduction and a conclusion

Music Talk

- 1. Bring song choice (from CD, iPod/mp3 player, or online)
- 2. Introduce the song and artist
- 3. Give some information on the artist/group
- 4. Explain why you like the song/artist and play a portion for the class
- 5. Provide the lyrics for the song, and explain your favorite part

****all songs must have appropriate lyrics for school - no swearing, no violent themed songs****

Comedian

- 1. Choose 5-10 appropriate jokes/riddles to tell the class
- 2. Tell the class where you got the jokes from
- 3. Explain why you chose the jokes to tell
- 4. Include an introduction and conclusion

****racist or offensive jokes will result in a zero and possibly greater consequences****

Demonstration

- 1. Introduce your topic and state what you are demonstrating
- 2. Explain each step as you demonstrate it
- 3. Bring all necessary props

Sports Report

- 1. Report on 1 local, 1 amateur, and 1 professional sporting event
- 2. Report on at least 2 different sports
- 3. Tell the class of any major sporting events coming up

Movie Talk

- 1. Introduce the movie title with names of main characters and actors' names
- 2. Explain what year the movie was made
- 3. Summarize the movie (don't give away the ending!)
- 4. If you own the movie bring it in and play a clip of your favorite part
- 5. Explain why you liked it

Headlines

- 1. Report any news from school, community, Canada, World
- 2. Choose 3 headlines to share
- 3. Explain the headlines and the importance of them

Book Talk

- 1. Bring a copy of the book for the meeting
- 2. Introduce the book, author, genre, copyright date, publisher
- 3. Briefly summarize book
- 4. State if you liked the book and why
- 5. Read a few of your favorite pages

Story Time

- 1. Choose an interesting/humorous experience to share with the class
- 2. You must prepare the story beforehand
- 3. Use appropriate body language and sound effects
- 4. Use pictures or props if necessary
- 5. Stories should be at least 2 minutes long

TV Talk

- 1. Introduce the TV show and the main characters
- 2. Give a general description of the program
- 3. Share when the program can be seen and what channel it is on
- 4. State likes/dislikes of the show

****TV shows must be appropriate to share with the class - ask if you aren't sure!****

Historical Moment/Person

- 1. Provide date and name or description of the event/person
- 2. Give the historical significance of the event/person
- 3. Explain why you chose this event/person
- 4. Give audience at least 3 points of interest and a few facts

Famous Person

- 1. Identify the person and what they are famous for
- 2. Share background information about the person (birth date, hometown, etc.)
- 3. Give a background about how the person became famous
- 4. Provide a few facts and interesting details about the person
- 5. If possible provide a picture of the famous person

Game Review

- 1. Introduce the game (board game, playground, video, computer, etc.)
- 2. Tell us why you like the game
- 3. Give a brief overview of how to play the game

Memory Box

- 1. Bring in a few items that are meaningful to you
- 2. Share with the class why it is meaningful and provide details
- 3. Show your item/items and pass around if able to

Master Chef

- 1. Speak about a favorite dish or food
- 2. Share the recipe and how to prepare it
- 3. Provide the teacher with a copy of the recipe
- 4. If possible provide a sample for the class
